The Hub

In Hub 1, we have been exploring what process art means and working together to create giant art work. This week we explored how we can change the colour of water using food colouring. Once we had made the colours we wanted, we added the food colouring to a water gun and sprayed giant pieces of paper. We had great fun watching the water drip down the paper, making the different colours mix together. We noticed that red and blue made purple and yellow and red made orange.







Nursery

This week in Nursery, we have enjoyed the World Book Day Celebrations. First, we enjoyed reading story and singing with our visitor Tim. Next, we dressed up for World Book Day, we shared some stories that we dressed up as. Then, we shared books with Year 3. Finally, we had a Stay and Play and shared some of our favourite stories with our adults.







Reception

This week the children have been exploring and comparing length. We have been exploring objects and using the language of length to describe them for example; long, not long, longer than, short, not short and shorter than. The children went on a hunt for sticks of different lengths in our outdoor area. We sorted them by their length, making a pile of short sticks and a pile of long sticks.

We have also been learning how to measure the length of objects and to make indirect comparisons using non-standard objects such as blocks or cubes to measure items, for example, "The wooden spoon is nine cubes long."





Year 1

As part of our topic Wonderful Weather, Year 1 have learnt about the equator. They explored globes and maps in an atlas to find the equator and looked at the different hot and cold countries around the world. We then used an iPad and collated photographs about hot and cold countries. They inserted text and photographs onto a document to present their findings.













Year 2

In our Literacy lessons, Year 2 have been using drama and forming a tableaux to convey some of the emotions and write an eye-witness account of the Great Fire of London. Then they were interviewed using a microphone about what they were seeing, feeling, thinking, hearing and smelling. They were fantastic and wrote some great pieces of writing from it.








<u>Year 3</u>

As part of World Book Day, Year 3 read the story 'The Smile' and thought about what a smile can do to help other people. We created our own illustrations in the style of the story and used glitter to show our smiles passing from one person to another.









Year 4

For World Book day, Year 4 looked at two stories: 'I Talk Like a River' by Jordan Scott and 'Julian is a Mermaid' by Jessica Love.

From 'I Talk Like a River', they had a session with Tim where ...

We also enjoyed a lovely afternoon reading with our buddies in Reception when they visited.
















Year 5

Year 6

For World Book day, Year 6 looked at two stories: 'I Talk Like a River' by Jordan Scott and 'The Word Collector' by Peter H Reynolds.

From 'I Talk Like a River', they created a morning call acrostic poem based on their name. the class then talked about the character and why they may have felt differently when in different situations. Year 6 discussed what a 'bad day' may look like and what we could do to support someone who might be having a bad day.

Next, the children looked at 'The Word Collector' and explored how words can impact someone's day. They talked about the quote, "One kind word can change someone's day." The children then chose a positive word to share with our buddies in Year 2 when they visited them for buddy reading in the afternoon.


Art News
